N.C.S.C.A.R. Travels to Yorktown and Washington, D.C.

On October 19, 1781, after many days of bombardment of the British forces by General George Washington's forces, General Cornwallis surrendered to General Washington. This surrender effectively ended the fighting in the colonies and secured the American independence. This day is celebrated annually at Yorktown, and members of the North Carolina Society Children of the American Revolution participated by laying a wreath at the Monument to Alliance and Victory and by walking in the Yorktown Day Parade. Mary Lee Howell, State Government Studies Chair and National Assistant Registrar, attended the wreath laying ceremony and parade with members from across the country.

- Be sure to forward all donations to the national president's project to the senior national treasurer at C.A.R. with your entry for the national president's project contest not later than February 28th.

- Be sure to send a copy of your society donation to the state national president's project contest chair and senior chair not later than February 28th.

To help meet the goal of providing 25,000 service hours by members of the C.A.R. world-wide, please submit all service hours during the year via the on-line form on the www.ncscar.org website, found under National Program and Project link at the top of the page. **Note that service hours that you submit do not have to be part of a C.A.R. activity or event: any service hours performed by any C.A.R. member during the program year should be submitted.**

Camille Edwards is the state chairman for the National President's project. Celeste Maus is the Senior State Chairman for the National President's project.

The National President's Program also includes 28 national officer and chairman contests, all found in the national program packet on the www.ncscar.org website. These contests all support the national president's program, and are identical to the state contests that support your state president's program. Entries to any of these contests provide a fun and exciting activity for local Society meetings, and the entries can be submitted both to the national and state level on the appropriate forms not later than February 28.

The National Society has 15 dedicated funds to provide support critical areas of operations. 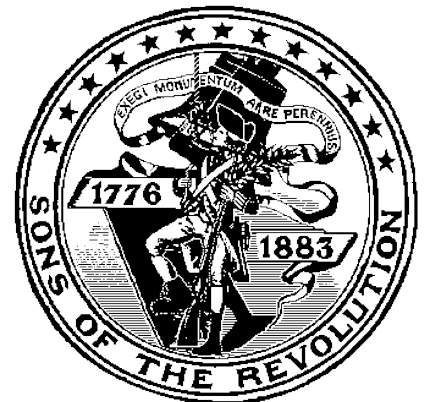

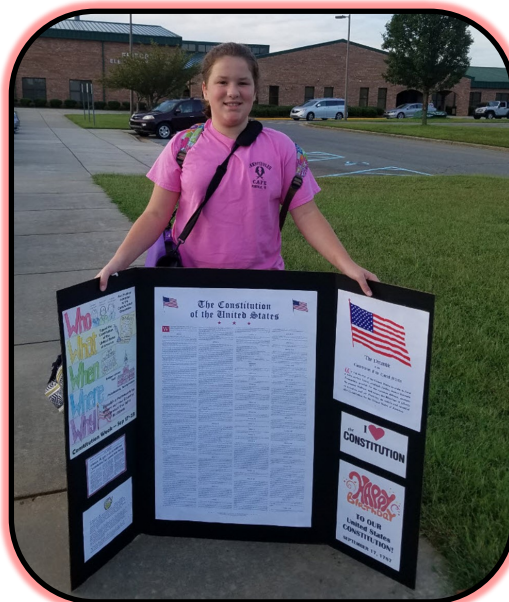
