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The new school year is underway, and with it comes a myriad of opportunities for every youth activity and interest for our youth that you can imagine! With so many educational and other demands on their plates, how does C.A.R. gain and retain our members' interest in C.A.R. as a part of their palette of activities?

The Local Society is the foundation of C.A.R., where each member calls home, where they have the most opportunities to make friends, grow, and develop their organizational and leadership skills, and where they really learn the traditions and habits of patriotism, good citizenship, and leadership. The local Society is where C.A.R. program delivery happens. It is the greatest challenge in all of C.A.R. to be a Senior Society President working with their Society President to develop and run a year-long program of meetings and activities that will capture the interests and imaginations of their members that range in age from zero to 21. Where do you get enough ideas and creativity to do that?

One answer is that both the North Carolina and the National program packets (available on their respective websites) provide enough contests (26) to let you work on a different contest every other week for the entire year to keep your members engaged in C.A.R.-focused activities. You can work on and complete many contests in just a meeting or two, and you can involve your members in more than a single contest during any given meeting. We have made the contests the same for both NC and national, so that you can and SHOULD submit your contest work to both following the specific NC and national procedures found in the program packets.

Even if doing contest after contest seems like it would get boring, take a look at the state and national Merit Contests. Both cover the many activities that every Society *should* be doing, and you can start your annual program planning by looking at the things you need to do to win a state and a national Merit Award, and then measure your progress against the Merit Award contest form as you go.

“Ya gotta be in it to win it!” Last year only seven of the 23 NC Societies entered even a single state contest, and only three of the 23 Societies in NC entered even one *national* contest.

Did you ever let a month or two go by without a Society meeting because you just didn't know what to do for an activity? This year, let your fingers do the walking through the program packets for inspiration, and you will almost certainly find something just right for your meeting!

Plan now to attend the NC Winter Member and Board Meeting near Hendersonville and Asheville on October 26, and the 2020 State Conference on March 20-22! We look forward to seeing everyone at both!


George Washington's boyhood at his family's home, Ferry Farm, shaped the man he would become. Many of the characteristics that made Washington a great leader were founded in his early upbringing at Ferry Farm. In 1738, Augustine Washington moved his family to Ferry Farm on the banks of the Rappahannock River near Fredericksburg, Virginia. The bustling nature of Ferry Farm and its surroundings played a critical role in George's development. Tragedy struck in 1743 with the death of George's father, and his then-single mother, Mary Ball Washington, remained at the farm to raise George and his siblings. Mary drilled into young George the principles of moral and civil behavior—honesty, dignity, integrity, dogged determination, and self-confidence.

The first goal of the Foundations of Freedom project will be to **raise funds for the reproduction Washington Family Desk at George Washington's boyhood home.** The replica desk would have been the desk that was in the parlor and used by all members of the Washington household to write letters or do school lessons. We will also support the development of Ferry Farm's web-based educational initiatives for students all over the world. One example of an exciting initiative the George Washington Foundation has begun is the creation of educational programming surrounding George's

beloved Rules of Civility and Decent Behavior targeting school-age children. For those who cannot visit in person, web-based educational programs will carry the lessons of young George's upbringing well beyond Virginia and provide insight into growing up in colonial times.

The second goal of the project will be to **highlight the leadership development opportunities that the National Society Children of the American Revolution offers our members.** As our creed says, "as the boys and girls of 1776 took an active part in the War for Independence, so the boys and girls of today have a definite work to do for their Country." What better way to become good citizens than develop leadership skills that will last a lifetime?

**This project strives to connect history and leadership.** By learning about the early life of George Washington and the code of conduct he strived to live by, members across the country can learn the foundations of citizenship he developed at Ferry

Farm. This project can be embraced by all members, regardless of their geographic location. Ultimately, it is an opportunity for members to learn about George Washington's upbringing, influences he had at a young age, and experiences he received given the circumstances of his boyhood. They can do this through planning meeting programs, completing contests, and other fun activities. The desk is a way we can leave a tangible contribution to this important site.

As George Washington learned life lessons at an early age, our members are learning how to become leaders at an early age by participating in C.A.R. activities. This project will formalize the educational opportunities our members are acquiring from the National Program and by completing state and national contests. Through the National Project, N.S.C.A.R. will be emphasizing that one doesn't need a title to be a leader.

I'm sure there will be many photos of the members that attended, so I thought I would include a snapshot of our parents, grandparents, and Seniors that are always there to support us. We thank you!




## Summer Board Meeting Minutes




## Summer Board Meeting Minutes continued



As your society plans its meetings for the 2019-2020 year, please consider supporting one of the DAR Mountain Schools. Only six schools in the nation have the special NSDAR-approved designation, including one college (Berry College). These schools were founded by DAR members who saw the need for a quality education for disadvantaged children in the Appalachian Mountains. Three of the Mountain Schools are highlighted below.

In 1913, Dr. Mary Sloop and her husband founded a boarding school for mountain children in Crossnore, NC. Today, the **Crossnore School & Children's Home** still works to educate children in need, with about half of the children coming from backgrounds of abuse or neglect.

The **Tamassee DAR School** in South Carolina is celebrating the 100th anniversary of its founding this year. Its mission is to "partner with children and families to overcome life's obstacles through campus and community based programs that nurture loving homes, inspire wholeness, expand educational horizons, and train exceptional citizens."

The **Kate Duncan Smith DAR School** in northeast Alabama serves children in grades K-12 in the Appalachian foothills. It emphasizes patriotic education and service to community and country.

There are many ways C.A.R. can support the Mountain Schools, such as collecting Box Tops for Education or collecting school supplies. Other ideas include providing blank greeting cards for the students or even becoming pen pals with a student! Listed below are the addresses and websites for the DAR Mountain Schools. Their websites provide more information about each school's particular needs. I hope your local society can find a way to partner with one of the Mountain Schools this year!


